A Letter From Our President and CEO

Dear Friends,

This is a time of extreme volatility and uncertainty. We are seeing uncertainty in the markets, seismic shifts in geopolitics, and significant changes in funding flows that profoundly affect the communities where we work. And we know the impacts of climate change and artificial intelligence will only increase, determining the present and future of the young people it is our mission to serve.

At EMpower, we roll up our sleeves and get on with doing all we can to fund, support, and scale practical and effective solutions for young people to have better lives—today and into their futures. By listening to and working with our partners and most importantly, young people, we know we can make a difference, and that fuels us every day.

In 2000, finance professionals founded EMpower to address inequities and alleviate poverty in the countries where they invested and where many were raised. By funding and scaling breakthrough approaches, we have helped to expand economic opportunities for young people, to increase their access to academic and vocational learning—both online and off—and to advance and prioritise their health and well-being.

Throughout, we have focused on young people's leadership, creating and promoting platforms for them to speak and be heard, and to improve and support their communities.

This year we celebrate our <u>25th anniversary</u>: 25 years of driving change and forging new pathways for some of the globe's most marginalised young people. For EMpower, it has always been about much more than just giving out grants

(as important as these are). We have harnessed every tool in our toolbox—networks, our unique position at the intersection of finance and youth empowerment, collaboratives with peer funders, collective learning—to foster transformation.

In these challenging times, our bedrock principles will be more needed than ever. Finding and funding local organisations with credibility, workable solutions, and staying power. Listening to and amplifying the voices and perspectives of young people. Investing for the long-term—knowing that durable change takes time. Staying agile and adapting to the current environment. Fostering

Youth Fellows Raise their Voices



At the core of our work is a firm belief that young people are, and should be, the experts in their own lives. With over twenty years of experience in engaging young people as leaders, we took many steps forward through our global Youth Fellows. Fellows selected from our grantee partner network served as advisors to EMpower's programmes, amplified their peers' perspectives, and informed our regional and country strategies—all the while developing and tapping into their leadership skills.

Our Youth Fellows are recruited across multiple regions to represent diverse perspectives tailored to the unique challenges and opportunities in their local context. They collaborated with our regional teams, bringing fresh perspectives to the issues that impact them the most and making EMpower's work more relevant and robust. From Metro Mumbai to South Africa's airwaves, their efforts reflected a shared commitment to improving the lives, wellbeing, and prospects of other young people. Here are highlights from the past year.

INDIA

"In my area, girls mostly stay at home and take care of household chores. They are not allowed to go out; the biggest issue is that they don't even want to go out. This is because no one has ever shown or explained to them that there is a whole world beyond their homes—one full of opportunities to learn and grow."

Recognising the many layers of inequality girls face, we have prioritised their rights from the beginning. In India, we established a Girls Advisory Council in 2018 to weigh in on our programmatic strategy and grantmaking decisions. This year, the GAC represented EMpower at important conferences and events and were part of key strategic touchpoints with our programme team and our India Advisory Council, including in check-in visits with our grantee partners. At a two-day learning exchange for our grantee partners in Mumbai, they led sessions on what it means to put girls at the centre of programmes serving young people. Witnessing the Fellows, our partners became convinced that youth-led engagement isn't just possible, it's powerful.


Allan is a social worker for the Kusuma Buana Foundation in Jakarta. As an EMpower Youth Fellow, he is keen to tackle the taboos around adolescent reproductive and sexual health, HIV, and gender-based violence. He believes that communication and empathy are essential for change to happen and that young people can play a critical role in that.

This year, our five Youth Fellows in Indonesia designed and began implementing a fully youth-led programme to promote safe and healthy lives for young people in Greater Jakarta. They developed solutions that resonate with their communities, such as creating safe spaces where mental health issues can be discussed and destignatised.

In Mexico, our six Youth Fellows gathered input from their peers on the top challenges they faced. The Fellows saw themselves reflected in the findings and felt motivated to take action to support others like them. They organised and led a virtual event with experts on sexual and reproductive rights and autonomy in decision-making. Showing newfound confidence and leadership, they helped to ensure EMpower's country strategy could be even more responsive to the needs of young people in Mexico.

Owam is from Ekurhuleni, where many young people face unemployment, teenage pregnancy, substance abuse, crime, and gender-based violence. She is studying accounting at the University of Johannesburg and volunteers at the Sisonke Wellness Foundation. She is a vocal advocate for improving young people's access to quality basic education, mental health support, and sexual and reproductive health care.

In South Africa, our four Youth Fellows focused on adolescent mental health. They worked closely with the EMpower team to lead initiatives to improve young people's resilience and well-being, especially those grappling with trauma. One of the highlights this past year was a deep dive into grantmaking, with the Fellows joining EMpower's Johannesburg grantee partner visits. They learnt from the pioneers behind these impactful organisations, such as Radio Workshop, which trains young people to become reporters so they can raise awareness on issues that matter to them and their communities.

Fostering Lasting Change

EMpower invests in local organisations for up to 10 years, guided by the principles of trust and collaboration, and understanding that change does not happen overnight. This <u>flexible</u>, <u>long-term approach</u> is key to effecting change in local communities around the world. We ensure the organisations that we support have the solid foundation, freedom, and space to innovate and take risks, try new solutions, and scale the ones that are effective. And along the way, we provide guidance and expertise. As a result, we see transformational change.

In rural Ghana, URBANET, a longstanding EMpower partner, has been educating and training young people in beekeeping as a sustainable livelihood. Participants learnt how traditional practices, such as tree-cutting and using fire for honey harvesting, can harm the environment. The training also emphasised the role of beekeeping in enhancing plant growth and biodiversity. As a result, the Chief and local leaders introduced laws banning all forms of bush burning and tree cutting.

And young people themselves are driving change. In East Bali—a volcanic region largely cut off from the rest of the island—economic pressures and child marriage, particularly for girls, often prevent them from staying in school. Nearly half are married by the age of 18.

Our longstanding partner, the East Bali Poverty Project, collaborated with another EMpower partner, PhotoVoices International, to educate young people, parents, village leaders, and government officials about sexual and reproductive health and rights, and the importance of preventing child marriage and early pregnancy.

The young participants quickly became passionate advocates. Using photography, they engaged with community members and district officials. Thanks to their efforts, three communities have recently ratified laws to prevent child marriage.

These examples illustrate how powerful change is possible everywhere.

Building Bridges and Mobilising the Field

Funders can play important roles not only in philanthropic investments of capital, granting to mission-aligned organisations, but also:

Encouraged by our grantee partners, who were keen for some of EMpower's practices, such as long-term investment and partnership, to be adopted more broadly in philanthropy, we have a strengthened intention for strategic influence. We've realised that we not only have a role to play but also a responsibility—to amplify what we've learned, share the insights we've gathered, and create opportunities for our partners and young people to speak on multiple platforms—all with the single-minded purpose of helping shape a more just and equitable world, especially for marginalised young people.

Towards this end, we published op-eds on topics where we seek to enjoin others (such as in Devex, Inside Philanthropy, and South Africa's Independent Online). We launched a monthly blog series, Shifting the Narrative, which explores key issues impacting young people, philanthropy, and the sector, sharing diverse perspectives from the EMpower ecosystem.

We also participated in the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women, Skoll World Forum, Clinton Global Initiative, International Capital Markets Association Conference, Re-Think Sustainable Business Forum, the AVPN Global Conference, and a 100 Women in Finance event, in addition to many other major events and meetings around the world.

We know that influence isn't just about speaking up. It's about listening carefully, learning continuously, and joining others for collective action and amplified impact. Guided always by our core value of humility, we continue to look for and capitalise on platforms that advance young people's priorities and viewpoints.

Fostering Community and Learning

We believe that transformational change happens faster and more effectively when organisations learn, collaborate, and grow together. That's why we go beyond funding—we actively foster deep, meaningful connections among our grantee partners, both locally and globally. By creating space for shared learning, innovation, and solidarity, we help partners sharpen their strategies, tackle common challenges, and amplify their collective impact.

One of our most powerful tools for doing this is the <u>Community of Practice</u> model—regional and country-based learning networks that bring our partners together to exchange knowledge, build capacity, and co-create solutions. In a world marked by uncertainty and complexity, these relationships are more than supportive—they are strategic.

LATIN AMERICA: SHARED KNOWLEDGE, SHARED STRENGTH

All 35 of our grantee partners in Latin America participate in a vibrant, regional Community of Practice, co-funded by the Tinker Foundation—whose grantee partners also join the dialogue. Led by our partner **Fundación Alvaralice** in Colombia, the group meets virtually

each month, forming a trusted platform for peer learning, real-time problemsolving, and collective growth.

Over the past year, the group explored timely and urgent themes such as youth mental health, 21st-century socio-emotional skills, and cutting-edge education models. These sessions didn't just spark dialogue—they led to real shifts in programming, equipping partners with the tools and insights needed to strengthen outcomes for young people across the region.

EAST & SOUTHEAST ASIA: GROUNDED IN YOUTH LEADERSHIP

In East and Southeast Asia, our youth-led partner **Pamflet Generasi** in Jakarta leads the "**AwareNest**" Community—uniting eight regional organisations advancing adolescent sexual and reproductive health and rights. In addition to monthly online convenings, members came together in Bali for a two-day in-person exchange that deepened relationships and expanded shared understanding.

Together, they explored human rights literacy, informed consent, and visited the **Sekolah Ekoturin**—a school run by fellow partner **East Bali Poverty Project**. In a safe, empowering space, they also played *berdaya* (Indonesian for "empower"), a card-based game designed to help youth navigate real-life scenarios of violence and bystander response. These exchanges created not only stronger strategies—but stronger leaders.

SOUTH AFRICA: BUILDING RESILIENCE THROUGH COLLABORATION

In South Africa, our Cape Town-based Community of Practice brings together nine partners focused on equipping social workers and youth facilitators to better support young people's well-being and resilience. Their collaboration is creating a ripple effect—strengthening care systems that reach thousands of youth.

We also support a second South African Community of Practice, composed of 12 organisations working to elevate their approaches to monitoring, learning, and evaluation (MLE). These partners are advancing new ways to measure what matters, capture complex qualitative data, and communicate their impact with clarity and confidence. As one participant reflected:

"I was reminded of the value of creativity. We discussed the challenges of reporting on complex qualitative data—and I left with bold new ideas I'm excited to implement."



Select Highlights from Last Year

76%

We provided the majority of our grantee partners with some form of capacity strengthening, such as support in financial sustainability. 68%

The largest group reached with our support is 10-14 years old, a critical time in adolescence.


